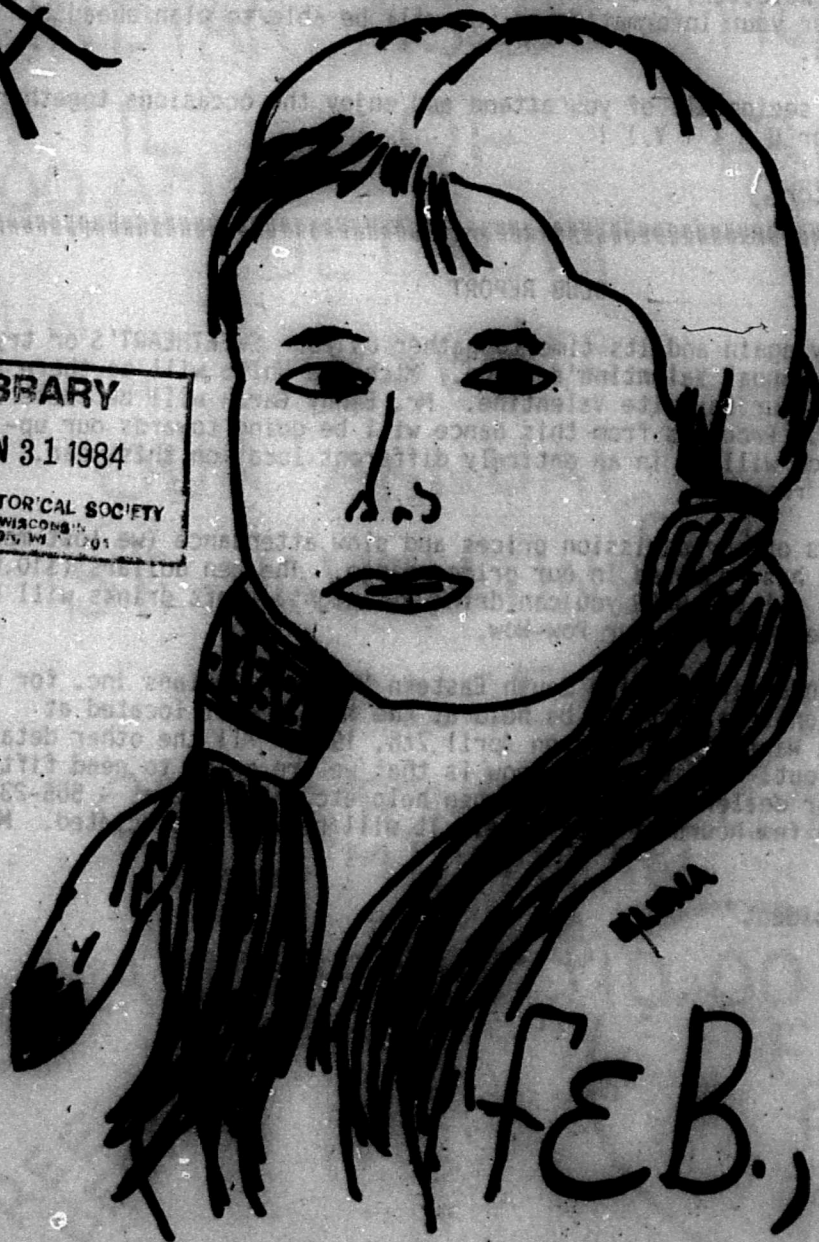

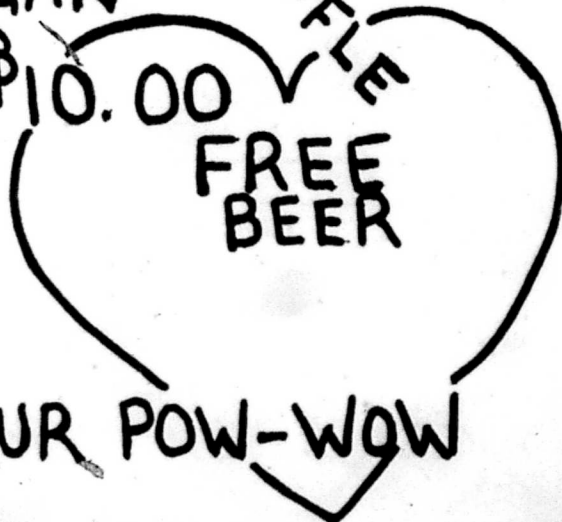

CRAZY HORSE

(Crazy Horse, S.D.) Pope John Paul has enthusiastically accepted a bronze cast of Sculptor Korczak Ziolkowski's smallest scale model for his Crazy Horse mountain carving, now in progress in the Black Hills of South Dakota.

The presentation was made at the Vatican by the Most Reverend Harold J. Dimmerling, Bishop of the Diocese of Rapid City, S.D. The bishop was in Rome to make a report on the affairs of his diocese. The Bishop said, "The Pope was extremely pleased with the Crazy Horse bronze.

He examined and scrutinized it very carefully."

Bishop Dimmerling also said, "The Holy Father and I talked about the Indian people in our diocese. He was somewhat surprised to learn that there are five (5) reservations in our diocese. I shared with him that the Jesuits, Benedictines, Sacred Heart Fathers and a Dominican were ministering to the Indian people. He was pleased to hear this, but cautioned that we must always respect the culture of our Indian brothers and sisters. I assured him that we always tried to do this, and I informed him that some of our priests were taking time to learn the Lakota (Sioux) language."

The cast of the sculptor's 1/1,200th scale model mounted on a piece of polished Crazy Horse granite was a gift to the pope from Mrs. Korczak Ziolkowski and the family of Korczak, who was born in Boston of Polish descent. The sculptor passed away on October 20, 1982 at the age of 74, his wife and large family are dedicated to carrying on his work according to the detailed plans he left for that purpose.

Korczak arrived in the Black Hills in 1947 to begin the Crazy Horse mountain carving at the invitation of Sioux Chief Henry Standing Bear who wrote him, "My fellow chiefs and I would like the white man to know the red man had great heroes, too." The sculptor promised the old Indians Crazy Horse would be more than a mountain carving, but a non-profit humanitarian educational and cultural project also including the Indian museum of North America and the University and Medical Training Center for the North American Indian:

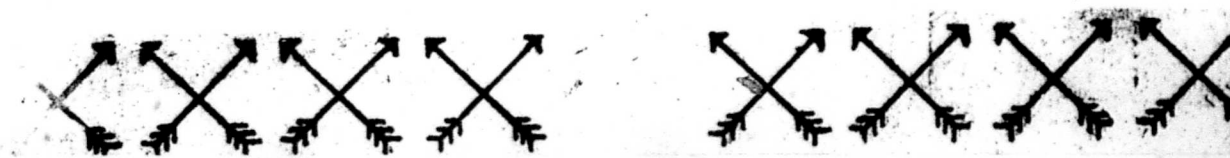

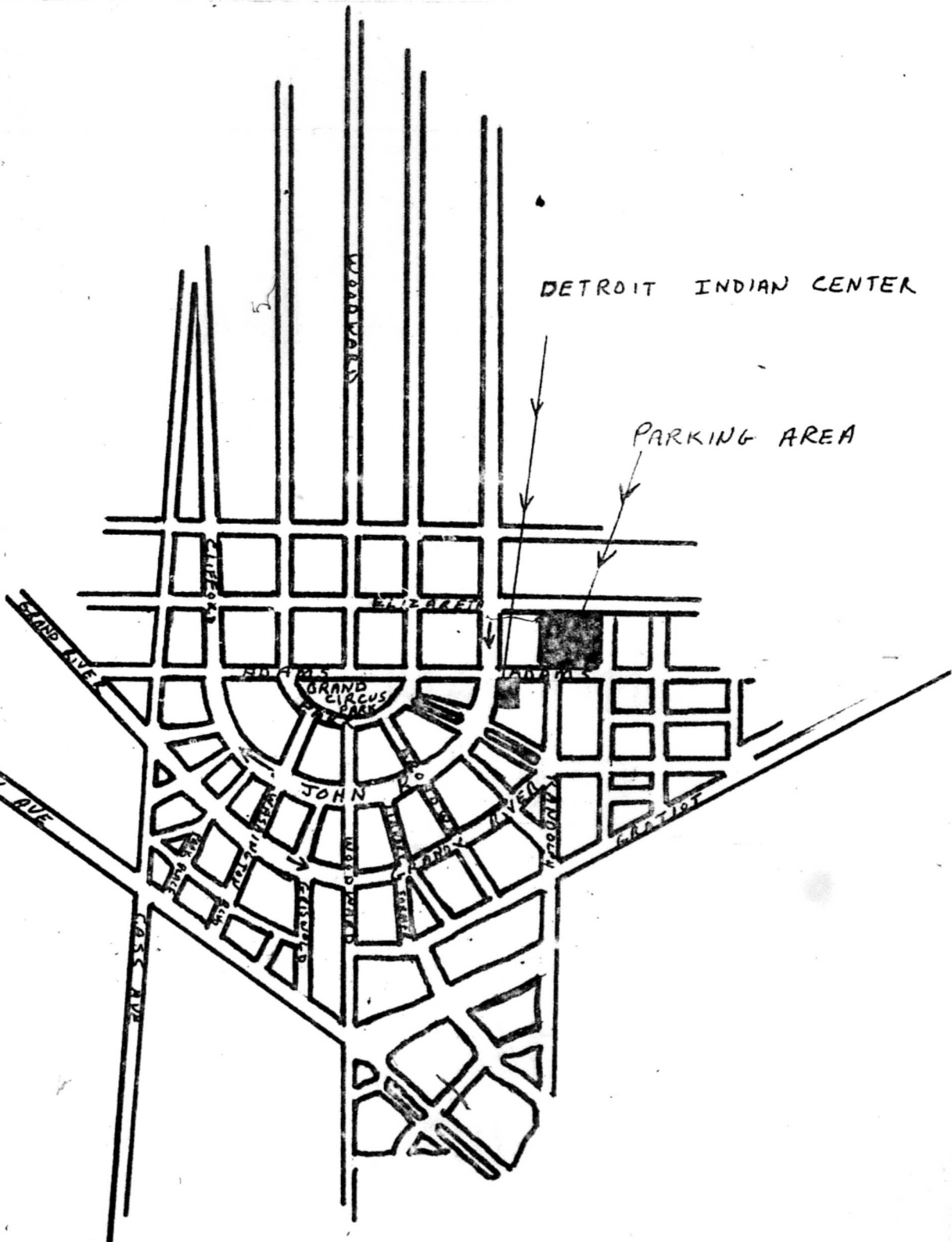

SOME STRATEGIES FOR PREVENTING ALCOHOL ABUSE

TEENAGERS WHO FEEL GOOD ABOUT THEMSELVES DON'T NEED ALCOHOL TO FEEL GOOD.
(IF THEY DO DECIDE TO DRINK, THEY'RE LESS LIKELY TO ABUSE ALCOHOL).

ENCOURAGE TEENAGERS TO DEVELOP THESE POSITIVE QUALITIES:

SELF-RELIANCE - Teenagers who have faith in their abilities don't need to use alcohol to escape their problems.

SELF-DISCIPLINE - Teenagers who set their own goals and work steadily to meet them, gain satisfaction that can't be found through drinking.

OPTIMISM - A person who is usually cheerful and inclined to anticipate good things is less likely to rely on alcohol to relax or "liven up a party".

DIRECTION - Teens who have interests in education, athletics, religion, or other commitments are less likely to spend time drinking.

RESPONSIBILITY - Teenagers who are encouraged to make their own decisions are in a better position to make wise choices about alcohol use.

SELF-ESTEEM - Those who have a high regard for themselves are less likely to yield to group pressure to use alcohol.

AMBITION - Alcohol can interfere with schoolwork and career plans. Teenagers with a strong desire to achieve won't let alcohol get in their way.

CONFIDENCE - A confident person will not be pressured into doing something that he or she doesn't want to do.

YOU CAN HELP YOUR TEENAGER DEVELOP THESE QUALITIES BY SETTING A GOOD EXAMPLE, COMMUNICATING OPENLY AND HONESTLY, AND GIVING LOVE AND ATTENTION.
