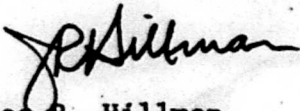

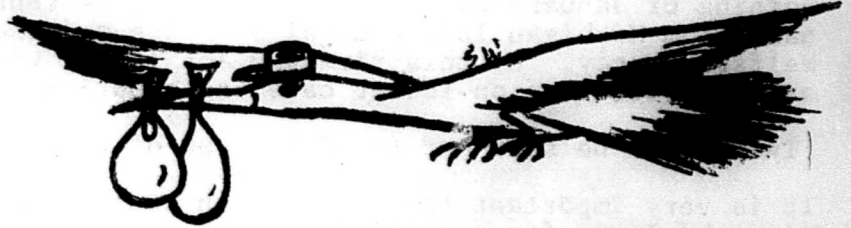

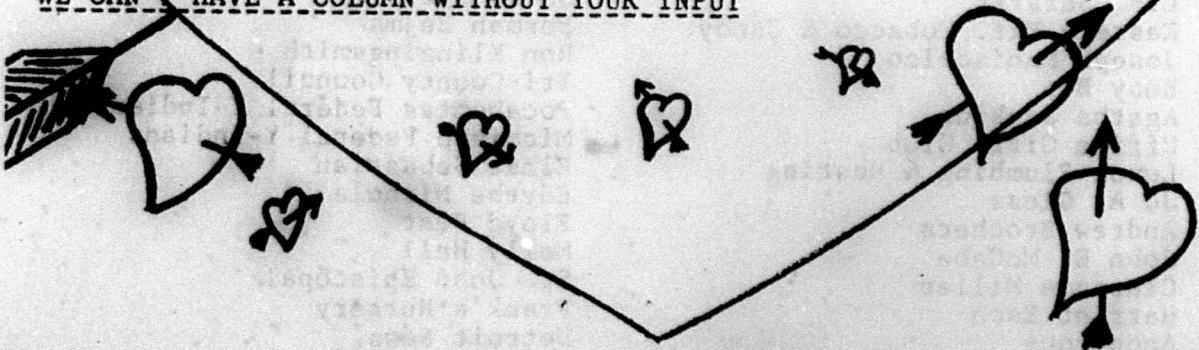

DETROIT NISHNAWBE WINS NATIONAL SCHOLASTIC AWARD

Diana Lualhati, a Native American woman, has been awarded the American Planning Association Fellowship for 1981-82. The \$4,000 award will pay for tuition, books, and other educational expenses. The Fellowship is awarded to four racial minority students in the U.S. and Puerto Rico each year who have shown excellence in their undergraduate work and show professional promise in their post graduate work.

Ms. Lualhati was named to the list of Outstanding Minority Community College for 1978 after concluding studies in Communications with emphasis in Journalism at Lansing Community College.

Ms. Lualhati was born and raised in the Brightmoor section of Detroit, Michigan. Her father, the late Claude Coy (Apache/French) served in the U.S. Navy during WW II and was known in Detroit for his work in the AFL/CIO and Alcoholics Anonymous. Her mother, Neaona (Irish/Choctaw) lives in Los Angeles, California. Both parents graduated from Redford High School.

She is working on a Master's Degree in Urban Planning at Michigan State University and recently completed a double Pre-law B.A. in Community Development and Public Policy Analysis with a minor in the Legal Rights of Women and Racial Minorities at the College of Urban Development at MSU.

INDIAN SUMMER

Why is "Indian Summer" called by that name and where did the term originate?

The origin of the name is as enigmatic as the arrival and duration of the warm weather interval itself. Records show it's been called Indian Summer for at least 200 years and some say it was named by the English who were reminded of the warm and often misty climate of the Indies. The English also call it Second Summer of St. Martin's Summer and Shakespeare referred to it as All Hallow Summer.

Other sources say the name probably originated with American settlers who were told by the Indians to expect mild and pleasant days between autumn's first frost and the onset of winter. Another story is that settlers called it that because the period of fair weather gave warlike Indians a chance to make more attacks. Europeans generally call it Old Wives' Summer while in Poland, where it usually lasts three to four weeks, it's called God's Gift to Poland. There is no doubt that it's a welcome bonus of summer's blue skies and sunshine even though the Emily Dickinson felt it was a "blue and gold mistake."

THE CRAZY HORSE MOUNTAIN

To date, Korczak has blasted approximately 7,200,000 tons of granite off the Thunderhead Mountain, as he continues to block out the 563 feet high and 641 feet long sculpture in the round. Finishing Crazy Horse will be the most time consuming and costly aspect of the mountain carving, and will require several times the \$4,000,000.00 Korczak singlehandedly has raised and spent.

The design for the stamp honoring Crazy Horse was officially unveiled by Assistant U.S. Postmaster General Eugene C. Hagburg on September 6, 1981 in the Indian Museum of North American in the southern Black Hills. September 6th was the 104th anniversary of the death of Crazy Horse and was sculptor Ziolkowski's 73rd birthday.

BIA'S INDIAN NEWS NOTES

TRIBAL SOVEREIGNTY ACKNOWLEDGED IN NEW YORK STATE LAND SWAP WITH TRIBE

New York State gave 795 acres of land to the Seneca Indian Nation in exchange for 795 acres of reservation land needed by the state to complete the last segment of the Southern Tier Expressway. For the Senecas, the trade was sweetened by a cash settlement, according to the New York Times, of approximately \$500,000. In addition, for the first time since the early 1800's, the two parties negotiated as equal sovereigns -- after a Federal judge ruled in 1976 that the state could not condemn reservation land for highway purposes. Following this court ruling the Senecas told the state that they would not negotiate with the state for the needed right of way until there was a commitment not to reduce the size of the Indian land areas.

OKLAHOMA VETS FORM VIETNAM INTER-TRIBAL ORGANIZATION

Oklahoma Indians who served in the armed forces in Vietnam have formed the Vietnam Era Inter-Tribal Association, believed to be the first organization of its kind. According to spokesman Harold Barse the group boasts 52 members from 16 tribes and is in the process of recruiting new members. Barse told the Muskogee Nation News plans for the group include an annual pow-wow, a newsletter for association members, a Vietnam veterans color guard, an inter-tribal guard clan, an all-Indian Vietnam veterans art show and association-sponsored sports teams. TRUDEAU TO REMAIN 'UNBLESSSED'

RED DEER, Alta. - The Nuxalk Indian Band stripped Prime Minister Trudeau of a blessing conferred on him eleven years ago by the Bella Coola area Band.

Ivan Tallio, a Nuxalk councillor, said that the blessing was the greatest honour the Nuxalk people could show anyone and now its being taken back because he (Trudeau) showed disrespect to all Indian people by agreeing to a constitutional compromise with nine premiers that deleted a guarantee of aboriginal rights.

Mr. Trudeau received the blessing during a visit to the band in the Bella Coola area of British Columbia in September of 1970. The blessing protects him wherever he goes.

In a ceremony, the band rescinded the blessing.

Sir Alexander Mackenzie was the first whiteman to receive the blessing which is rarely given to non-Indians. It is conferred in an elaborate ceremony, ending with the placing of eagle down on the head of the recipient.

Mr. Tallio was attending as an observer at an emergency meeting of the Indian association of Alberta - called to plan accelerated lobbying efforts in London to block patriation of the constitution - when he made the announcement.
