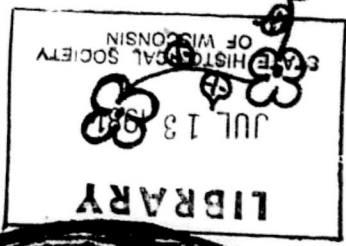

There are some new jobs opening up at the center. We are looking for an Indian Child Welfare Act Worker, he/she should have good educational and experience background, have a car, and be able to communicate with city, state, and federal agencies.

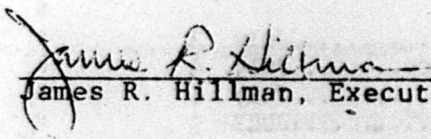
We are sponsoring a dance with the HARD CORP ROCK BAND at the Local 51 UAW Hall, 11731 Mount Elliot, July 10, 1981. Admission charge will be \$5.00 per person, no minors allowed. You must be 21 years of age to enter. All the beer you can (safely) handle, dance and rock until 1:30 a.m.

Our pow-wow is July 11, 12, 1981. Shared dancers and singers fees, every performer paid for three (3) performances. Little or no admission charge. Come on out, enjoy yourselves, see announcement elsewhere for further details and directions.

We have been designated prime sponsor for four (4) counties in Southeastern Michigan, Wayne, Oakland, Macomb and St. Clair. We expect a reduced program this next fall, and more people are putting demands on our program, so please don't expect us to be able to offer the same level program as last year. Things are tightening up.

We are submitting a proposal to the City of Detroit, Neighborhood Services Department to be our own direct sponsor of the Head Start Program. Anyone with children from age 2½ to before kindergarten age can apply with Eva Kennedy at the Indian Center.

If we can't keep forty (40) kids on our program, we will be out of business. We are working with parents, MUIHC, volunteers and staff to design a really good project, so let's join together and sponsor an all Indian project. Remember - our children are our future.

INDIAN CHILD WELFARE COORDINATOR: Salary Range: \$13,000 - \$15,000

Prefer American Indian. Should have Bachelor's degree in Social Sciences field, counseling, or related area. MSW desirable, but not necessary. Must have some knowledge of Indian Child Welfare Act, and be able to present seminars, training sessions and make public presentations on the Act.

HEAD START POSITIONS

TEACHER: Salary Range: Negotiable

SUPREME COURT RULES AGAINST CROW TRIBE
IN BIG HORN RIVER CASE

The United States Supreme Court rules March 24 that the State of Montana, and not the Crow Tribe or the United States government, owns the Big Horn River as it flows through the tribe's reservation. The court also determined that the tribe had no power to regulate non-Indian hunting and fishing on reservation land owned in fees by non-members of the tribe. The tribe claimed that it had jurisdiction over its reservation including the Big Horn River, under treaties with the federal government signed in 1851 and 1868. A federal district court had ruled against the tribe, but was reversed by an appeals court. The Supreme Court ruled that the riverbed was not given to the tribe by the treaties establishing the reservation and that Montana gained jurisdiction over the riverbed and the banks of the river when it achieved statehood. Justice Potter Stewart wrote the majority decision, joined by Chief Justice Warren Burger, and Justices Harry Blackmun, William Brennan, Jr., and Thurgood Marshall, who said the Supreme Court has ruled that Indian treaties must be construed "in the sense in which they would naturally be understood by the Indians."

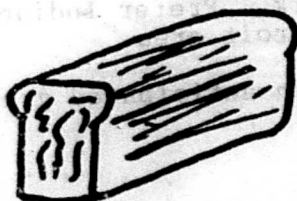

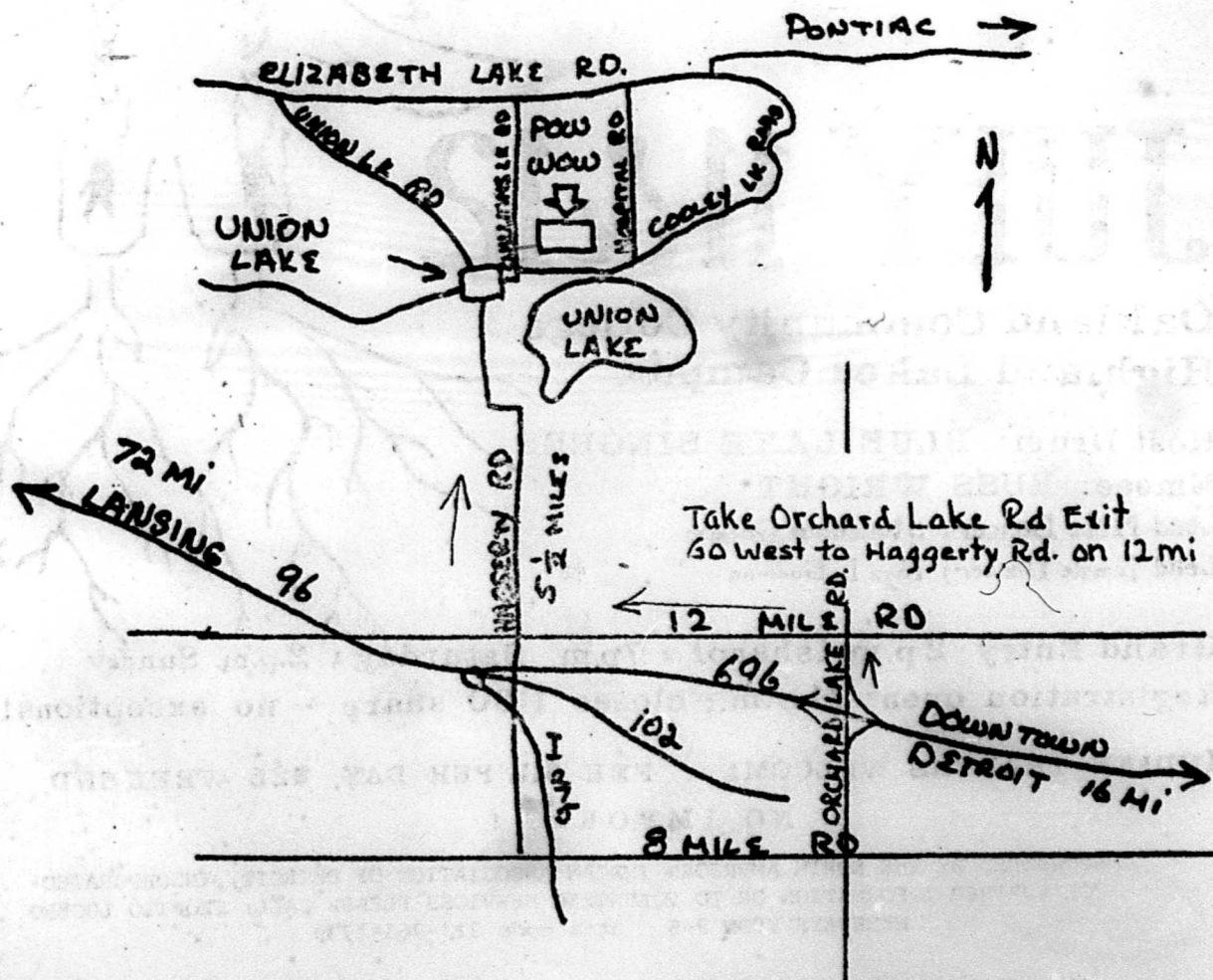

DANCERS INSTRUCTIONS

Because of the somewhat unusual method of paying dancers in the pow-wow, we are writing the special instructions down for your convenience and to help remind you of the "rule" for participating.

Dancers and singers must register between 11:00 a.m. and 1:30 p.m. on Saturday. Registration closes at 1:30 p.m., SHARP. No exceptions will be made for anyone. Each dancer will be given a number. Keep this number with you at all times during the performances, and present the number for payment after the final performance. Performance starts at 2:00 p.m.

The ticket you will receive will be used at the meals. No ticket, no meal. NO EXTRA TICKETS WILL BE ISSUED.

Any dancer who wishes to dance without a number may do so, but will not receive any pay, nor will he/she be eligible for any prize money.

Each dancer and singer will be paid an amount of money for performing in all three performances. Dancers numbers will be checked during the Grand Entry of each performance. No fee will be paid for less than three performance.

The exact amount of money will be determined by the number of entries, and by the number the two (2) performances. We expect that each dancer will receive somewhere between \$10 and \$15.

Payment for Dancing and Singing will be immediately after the final performance.

CONTEST RULES

Contestants must participate in all performances to be eligible for prizes. Prizes in six (6) categories: men, youth, children, women, youth, children.

OTHER

All Blanket dance proceeds go towards the building fund for a new Indian Center.

INDIAN NEWS NOTES: A Publication of the Bureau of Indian Affairs
Office of Public Information Staff.

The Administration for Native Americans (ANA) published an announcement in the Federal Register April 28 that it will accept applications for grants for tribal environmental protection programs through July 13, 1981. The primary objective of the program is to assist tribal governments to develop or enhance their institutional capability to undertake environmental protection projects and enforce environmental standards on reservation lands. The projects are jointly funded by ANA and the Environmental Protection Agency. PRISON RUN BY AND FOR INDIANS FORCED TO SHUT DOWN: Swift Bird Prison, opened in August 1979 on the Cheyenne Sioux Reservation, South Dakota, to serve Indian prisoners, has been closed. The Cheyenne River Sioux Tribal Council, which ran Swift Bird, has asked the Federal government to take over the facility for use as an institute for juvenile delinquents. The minimum security prison, where elements of Indian culture such as Sweat Lodges and Medicine Men were part of the environment, was designed to house 60 prisoners but never held more than 25. The number of prisoners was critical since the prison was paid by the states and the Federal government for each prisoner it kept. Prison organizers had hoped to draw Indian prisoners from all around the nation.

CALIFORNIA, OKLAHOMA, ARIZONA HAVE LARGEST INDIAN POPULATIONS: California now ranks as the state with the largest Indian population, according to 1980 advance reports from the Bureau of the Census. California's count of 201,311 American Indians, Eskimos and Aleuts is substantially greater than Oklahoma's 169,464 and Arizona's 152,857. Oklahoma was the leader in the 1970 census. Other states in the top ten are: New Mexico, 104,777; North Carolina, 64,635; Alaska, 64,047; Washington, 60,771; South Dakota, 45,101; Texas, 40,074; * and MICHIGAN, 40,038. The second tier of ten includes: New York, 38,732; Montana, 37,270; Minnesota, 35,026; Wisconsin, 29,497; Oregon, 27,309; North Dakota, 20,157; Florida, 19,316; Utah, 19,256; Colorado, 18,059; and Illinois, 16,271. The Indian populations in some other western states are: Kansas, 15,371; Nevada, 13,304; Idaho, 10,521; Nebraska, 9,197; and Wyoming, 7,125. The state with the smallest Indian population is Vermont, 964. The Census Bureau's documents describe the category "American Indian, Eskimo and Aleut" as including persons who classified themselves as belonging to one of those racial categories and those persons who identified themselves as belonging to a specific Indian tribe.

SENATE INDIAN COMMITTEE AUTHORIZES \$50 MILLION FOR CETA-SUBSTITUTE PROGRAM: Under pressure from a May 15 deadline for passing funding bills, the Senate Select Committee for Indian Affairs approved S. 1088 which authorized continued funding for the Administration for Native Americans and, through a special amendment, \$50 million in both 1982 and 1983 for some kind of Indian CETA-Substitute program. Members of the Committee noted that there had been no hearing held on the bill, but approved it with the understanding that hearings would be scheduled and opportunity provided for needed clarifications and amendments. The ANA authorization was for \$28 million in both 1982 and 1983, a cut of approximately \$5 million from 1981 funding. The proposed \$50 million would be about 20 percent less than was provided for Indian CETA programs in 1981.

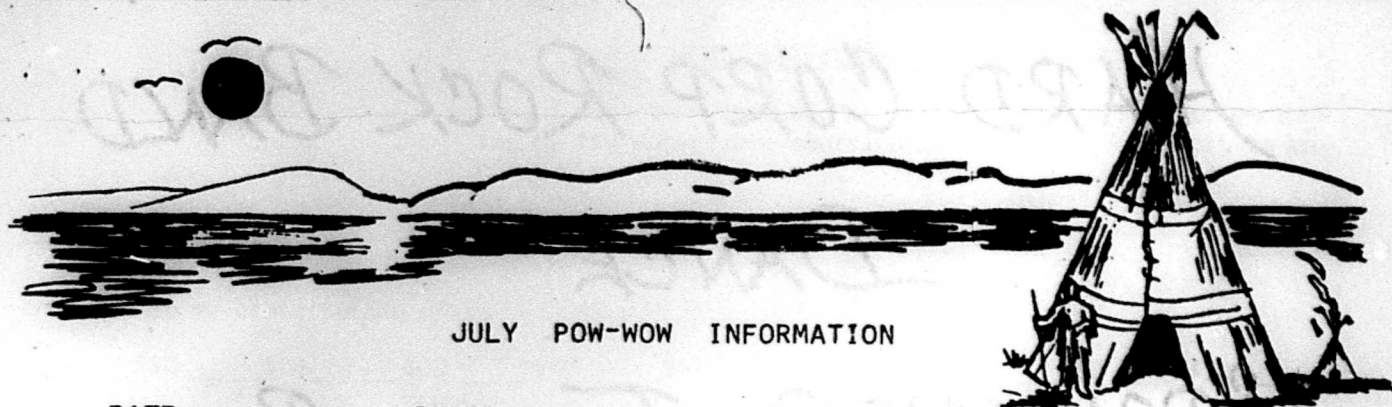
