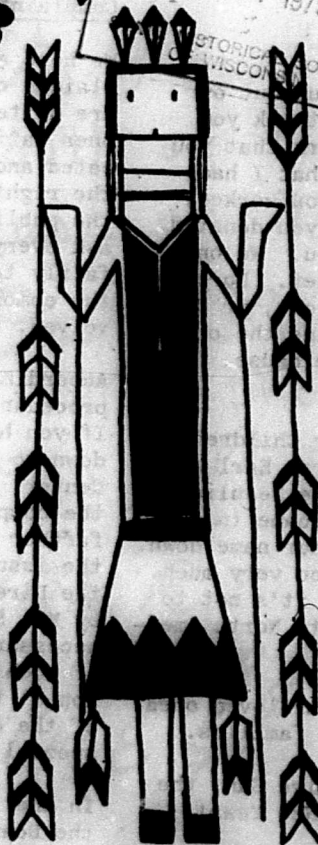
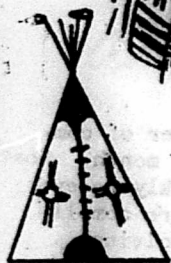

Complaint Procedure

We here at the Center handle a number of com-
plaints of one kind or another each month. Most
are quite small and are solved quickly to every-
ones satisfaction. However, some are compli-
cated and require investigation involving
the rights of privacy, employees rights, and
the public's right to know. We would like to
ask everyone to understand that we must act
fairly to both the community person from whom
the complaint arises, and to the employee in-
volved.

Accordingly we have developed a complaint
procedure that we ask everyone to follow.
If you have a complaint, call, write or come
down to see Ms. Silvey (963-1026) at the
Center. After hearing what the nature of
the complaint is, she will determine whether
further meetings are necessary to resolve
the issue, and will report the incident to
the Director. If the issue is not resolved
by Ms. Silvey right away, or after any meeting
necessary has been held, to the satisfaction
of each party involved, either party may
appeal the decision to the Board of Directors
of the Center personnel committee in a
special closed session.

In the future we will not hear complaints at
the Board meetings unless they do not concern
personnel or personal complaints and only after
they have been dealt with by Ms. Silvey and
the staff first.

WHAT'S NEW

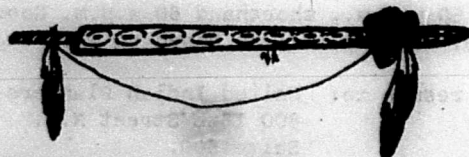
Apologies:

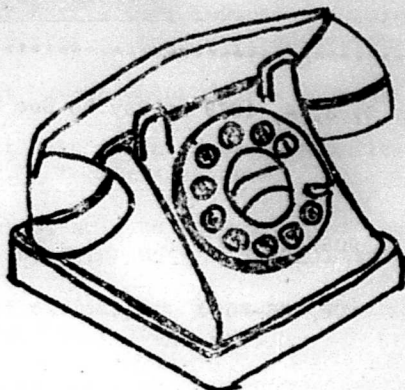


NAME THAT INDIAN SPOKESMAN: According to a State Department report an Indian spokesman has promised Rhodesian natives 5,000 veteran Indian troops from the Shoshone, Blackfeet and Apache Tribes to assist them in their battle for freedom. This information was published in the Zambia Times for December 2, and the spokesman was identified as Puersa Rustec, the leader of a confederation of Indian warriors with headquarters in Washington, D.C. The State Department official said they could not identify Rustec, but when they played with the spelling of the name Rustec was quickly unscrambled to read Custer. Puersa, the official said, was less clear but looked like it could be unscrambled into some kind of obscene phrase by reversing the first two letters and making some other adjustments.

INDIAN VILLAGE IN ARIZONA IS FIRST SOLAR CITY: The Papago Indian Village of Schuchuli, long lighted by kerosene lamps, initiated a \$100,000 solar power system December 17. The system, paid for by the Federal Government, local governments and the Papago Tribe, was dedicated in ceremonies at the desert village of 96 persons, which has had no electricity. Until now, the villagers did their washing by hand or drove 20 miles to take it to the nearest laundry. Water was pumped by a diesel engine. The solar power system will provide energy for lights, a water pump, refrigerators and washing machines. An official of the Federal Energy Department said in Phoenix.

It is valuable to Cherokees, historians, libraries, genealogist, archives, researchers, and all other races, living in the area at that time.

Outreach Worker-CHR's Wanted:

Qualifications:

1. Must have a car; insured and in operable condition - checked by supervisor.
2. Must have a chauffeur's license.
3. Must have a high school education or G.E.D. to start program.
4. Must be able to attend out-of-town training for up to 3 weeks/session.
5. Must participate in career training; community college level.
6. Must be able to communicate orally and in writing with public; clients; agencies.

Job Duties:

1. Work under supervision of D.A.I.C. Health Department personnel.
2. Will transport clients to existing services in areas of health, etc. as the situation demands.
3. Will identify problems which need corrective action.
4. Will develop, with supervision, a plan of service for each family or individual based on an evaluation of their needs.
5. Serves as liaison between DAIC and existing service agencies.
6. Coordinates advocacy for Indian people with supervisor and/or other appropriate people.
7. Will be required to keep daily records of; travel, case files; contacts; referrals and others as required.
8. Will refer clients to DAIC specialists; will be responsible for maintaining the follow-up with those clients for those referrals and any other referrals made. (Develop & maintain follow-up plan)
9. Will arrange education and other training such as assertiveness training for clients; develop survival skills, etc. as necessary.
10. Will help DAIC staff develop new programs where necessary

11. Must perform other related duties as directed.

To the Indian Community:

The Keweenaw Bay Tribal Council, as part of its Comprehensive Health Care Services, has recently instituted a program for Michigan Indians interested in pursuing a career in the medical and allied fields of education. The purpose of our project is to advise, recruit, and counsel Indians on educational opportunities, grants, financial aids, scholarships, and training programs available in the various fields of health careers. Our primary targets will be Indian students, grade 9-12, with Indians, ages 18-44, as our secondary targets. Additionally, we will be developing a state-wide Health Skills Job Bank for Indian students. Ideally, this Job Bank will allow the students O.J.T. experience in their respective study areas.

At this point we are initiating contact with all tribes, groups, organizations, and communities in our role as a resource tool for Indians. As a resource, we invite referrals and/or requests for information regarding health professions. We are also available for specific counseling and presentations to individual students or groups in Health Career information.

FORTY INDIAN GROUPS PETITION FOR FEDERAL
STATUS AS TRIBES

The Bureau of Indian Affairs has received petitions from forty Indian groups seeking to be acknowledged by the Federal Government as Indian tribes.

A list of the forty groups, from 21 states, is being published in the Federal Register as required by regulations made effective October 2, 1978. These regulations establish the procedures for establishing that an American Indian group exists as an American Indian Tribe.

A total of 496 Indian or Alaska Native groups are now acknowledged by the Federal Government to be tribes. These groups are located in 27 states and include 218 Alaskan Village groups.

Under the regulations only those groups whose members and their ancestors existed in tribal relations since aboriginal times and have retained some aspects of their tribal sovereignty can be acknowledged as tribes. Failure to be acknowledged under these regulations would not constitute a denial that the group is Indian. Acknowledgment of tribal existence is a prerequisite to the protection, services and benefits from the Federal Government available to Indian tribes.

Groups from seven states, not presently listing any federally recognized tribes, are among the petitioners. These states are Alabama, Connecticut, Delaware, Georgia, Maryland, Massachusetts, and South Carolina.

Other states represented by petitioners are: Alaska, California, Colorado, Florida, Kansas, Louisiana, Michigan, Montana, New Mexico, New York, North Carolina, North Dakota, Oregon & Washington.

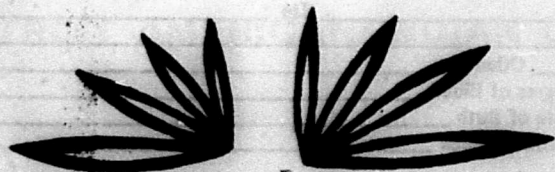

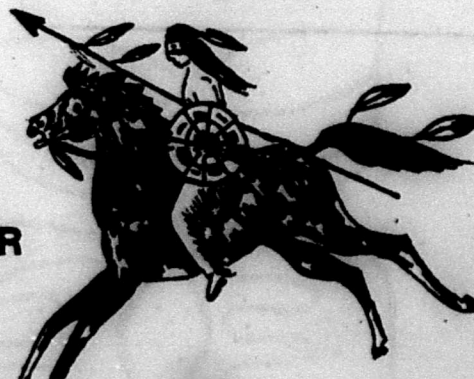

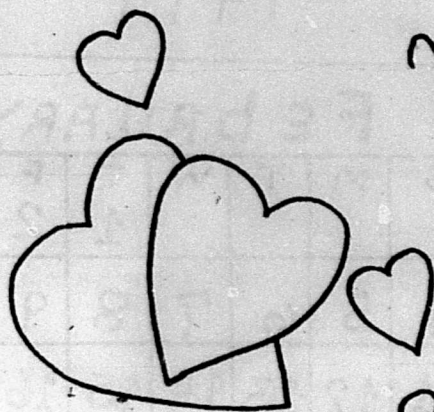
