Indians forced out by DAC expansion

Local American Indians are being pushed out of their downtown headquarters by the exclusive Detroit Athletic Club (DAC). The Detroit American Indian Center, which coordinates social services for Americans, is being evicted from the two-story building it leases at 360 John R to make room for the expansion of the adjacent DAC.

The DAC bought the building from the Kresge Foundation in September. In November, the Indians were asked to pack up and leave by the end of the year, but an extension was granted through the end of

January. Mic Bossler, DAC executive manager, said the club is considering another extension through February.

THE INDIANS said they need the extra time to find a new home. If the center closes — even temporarily — the group would lose most of its state and federal funding.

Irene Lowry, executive director of the Indian center, said: "Once we were relocated, we would have to go through the red tape of filing proposals and petitions, and we would have to wait (for the money)."

The Indians pay \$1,200 a month rent for the 12,000-square-foot building, which Bossler said will be demolished.

He said no plans have been made final for the property, which is behind the DAC. Probable expansion "could include additional athletic facilities and parking space," Bossler said.

MS. LOWRY SAID more than 10,000 services a month are provided under various programs at the center — which would "break down to between 2,000 or 3,000 persons who are being assisted each month."

Bossler said the DAC has been working with the center to help it relocate "and possibly find a gift building." However, Ms. Lowry says none has been found, and funds have been dwindling.

Support from Michigan's Department of Social Services has dropped from \$40,000 to \$11,000 since 1979. The federal Administration for Native Americans (ANA) program has sliced its grant from \$120,000 to \$60,000 since 1982.

SHE ESTIMATES that federal, city and state subsidies this year total about \$533,000, including \$413,000 from the U.S. Department of Labor for an employment and training program.

The center is preparing to petition the Kresge Foundation for a grant to help purchase and renovate another building in Detroit. Ms. Lowry said the foundation is scheduled to consider proposals at the end of next month.

Center Classes

Clerical I - REFRESHER TYPING, a four week program, 3 hours/day.

Funding for Minority Businesses

For those businesses located in the Detroit, there are other opportunities which have become available.

The foremost of these is the money available through the newly-created Strategic Fund. This is a fund created to aid small minority businesses which have thus far been considered high-risk and therefore unable to obtain loans through regular channels such as banks. This may be due to several reasons, including: lack of collateral; lack of size to justify the kind of undertaking the owners have in mind.

Regulations which govern the application for Strategic Funding:

1. Business must be 51% Minority-owned.
2. Must be certified through the Michigan Minority Business Council.
3. Must be unable to obtain loans through regular channels.

Many times, certification through the M.M.B.C. is the only access to many of the opportunities and contracts available as this agency deals directly with the industry involved.

The toll-free number which will put you on record as applying for a loan is: 1-800-831-9090.

This is the beginning of documentation in your loan application since any information given is automatically entered in the computers and forms part of the basis upon which your loan is considered.

A division of General Motors is seeking a manufacturing/service industry supplier base from Indian reservations located near their manufacturing and assembly plants. House & Senate Bills

The House passed on October 7, HR 1904, a bill providing for the use and distribution of funds appropriation for certain members of the Mississippi Band of Chippewa Indians in Docket 18-S, before the Indian Claim Commission. The bill is pending in the Senate Select Committee on Indian Affairs.

The House and Senate have approved HR 1903, legislation regarding the use and distribution of the judgement funds appropriated to certain members of the Lake Superior Band of Chippewa Indians in dockets 18-S and 18-U.

S. 1106, legislation approving distribution of the judgement funds for the Saginaw Chippewa Tribe of Michigan has been approved by the Senate and by the House Interior Committee. The next step is consideration of the bill on the House floor.

Legal Harassment

The constitutional right to a speedy trial does not prevent Dennis Banks and three other members of A.I.M. from being tried under indictments which were filed more than 10 years ago.

At least this is the ruling which was handed down by the Supreme Court on January 21, 1986. According to the decision by the 5 out the 9 judges the rights of the four men were not violated because they were not under indictment most of those ten years and were also free without bail. The four defendants in the case U.S. vs Loud Hawk contended that their rights to a speedy trial had been violated in bringing them to trial on charges of possessing dynamite and firearms.

Two federal courts agreed but the charges were re-instated by the Supreme Court.

Justice Lewis Powell wrote for the majority of the Judges that most of the delay in the 90 month period was taken up by government appeals to dismissed indictments and should not be counted due to the fact that they were therefore not under indictment at that time, nor were they subject to bail.

The dissenting Judges, Thurgood Marshall William Brennan Jr., Harry Blackmun, and John Paul Stevens said the government should pay for the delays which contributed to an excessive delay in due process. These delays were greatly contributed to by the Five-year backlog for two pre-trial appeals to be decided by the U.S. 9th Circuit Court of Appeals.



The Toxic Great Lakes

WASHINGTON - People living around the Great Lakes are threatened by toxic chemicals then other North Americans because their drinking water and foods may be contaminated with lake pollutants, says a joint U.S./Canada study.

"There is an urgency to achieve a reduction of toxic pollutants in the Great Lakes and thereby to reduce the risks to the human population" a committee convened by the U.S. Nat'l Research Council and the Royal Society of Canada said in its report.

New concerns about long-term health risks are being raised by growing evidence that Great Lakes area residents are exposed to, and accumulate "appreciably more" toxic chemicals than other people, the researchers said. "The difference appears to be largely due to the higher contaminant levels of food products derived from the lakes and the basin," the report said.

The study reviews progress made under the Great Lakes Water Quality Agreement between the United States and Canada, first signed in 1972 and strengthened in 1978.

I don't think anybody expects people to drop dead from levels of contaminants that are in these waters...", said committee co-chair Henry Regier of the Inst. for Environmental Studies at the Univ. of Toronto.

"The fears that many of us have, and fears that are pretty new to some of us, are that the current levels of contaminants out there will have an effect, in cancers and other things, that will only become apparent decades from now, with the children that are growing up in these areas," he said. Regier stressed that such concerns still are more a fear than a "well-substituted fact."

The report said that while toxic exposure of humans isn't well documented, Great Lakes residents "are inadvertently exposed to a large number of chemicals" through sources such as drinking water

drawn from the lakes, contact with water during recreation and consumption of food originating in the basin.

Foreign Aid for Michigan Indians?

CROSS VILLAGE, MICHIGAN:

Ottawa Indians here are hoping foreign nations or local corporations will help them in their quest for funds in order that they may buy a homeland in Northern Michigan on land they contend was taken from them by the U.S. government.

Homelands have been purchased for B.I.A.-recognized tribes but not for those which are not affiliated with them. Of Michigan's 9000 Ottawa Indians, the B.I.A. recognize only a about 250. The Ottawa refused affiliation because to do so would mean that they would have to give up personal and tribal sovereignty. They would receive the benefits that other tribes do in return for this but "they are too proud to surrender their sovereignty".

Peggy Hemenway, spokesperson and leader for the Little Traverse Band, said that any money their appeals do receive will be used for the self-sufficiency of the Ottawa Band, such as an Indian school where the elders would teach, a health-care facility and towards the production of their own food.

Little Traverse recently filed suit in the U.S. district court in Grand Rapids to demand a declaration of judgement for treaty rights. Without treaty rights, they are subject to D.N.R. official policy. With treaty rights, they would be allowed to subsistence hunt and fish and to form their own rules and regulations governing hunting and fishing. The Ottawa contend that they have the right to hunt and fish without state licenses by whatever means they wish.

Leaders have called for a meeting of all Ottawa people, in Cross Village where tradition says that their people have lived since prehistoric times. Meeting to convene August 14-16, 86.

1987 ALL INDIAN WORLD OLYMPICS

The North American Indian Athletic Assoc. Olympic committee is proud to announce the First Historic All-Indian World Olympics to be held June 24th through July 4, 1987. The site of the Olympics will be Tulsa, OK. This event is expected to be represented by at least 300 Indian Nations and 98,000 participants. There will be 68 different events offered during the two week period of the Olympics. There will be several events offered in the All-Indian Olympics that are not offered in the General World Olympics. All teams and participants must affiliate themselves with their own Indian Nations. Each Indian Nation will hold their own Olympic tryouts for their teams and participants. These tryouts should be held as soon as possible. Each individual Indian Nation must pay an Olympic Registration Fee of \$5,000.00 to support this historic event.

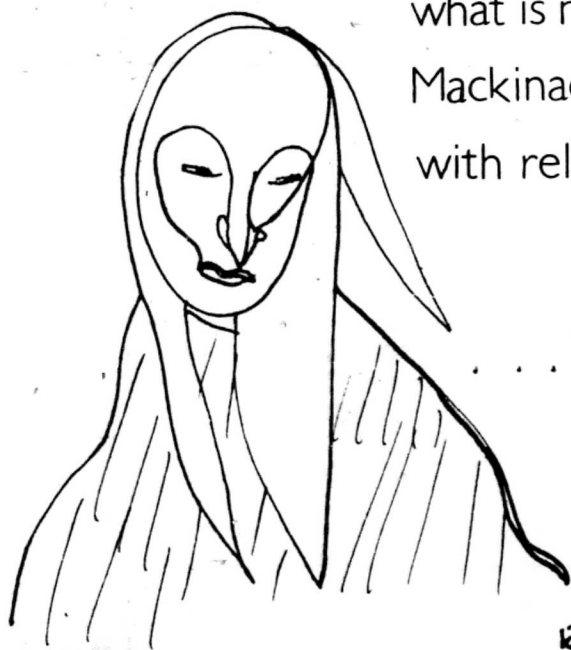

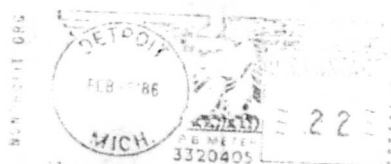
