DIRECTOR'S REPORT

This month the Board of Directors took a forward-looking step by approving the submission of an application for funds to try an economic development concept which could turn some things around the outlook of continued and future federal funding for the Indian Center.

Most of the Reagan administration activities in the federal funding area are going in the direction of the community Indian Centers' seeking not only social programming, but seeking ways for there to be self-sufficiency in economic development areas.

While we have not made any commitments to anything yet, we will be trying to work with Indian reservations in marketing products they produce. We would try to market those products here in Detroit, and would need some grant support for that effort.

Sometime in the future we might be able to get grants and loans to get into business as a result of successfully operating economic development projects. However, we still need grant support to start ideas going, and our Board decided to at least take a look at that direction for the future.

Anyone with some ideas on this concept should plan to attend our Board Meeting on Saturday, February 6, 1982 at 10:00 a.m. at the Center. We look forward to seeing you there.

AN EASTERN LEGEND

Many years ago a young Indian man built a small lodge away from the home of his family. He had arrived at the proper age to undertake a fast and learn what kind of spirit would be his guide and guardian through life. He entered his little lodge where he would not be disturbed, and prepared himself to receive a spirit.

He sought to clear his heart of every evil thought, and to think only good, beautiful, and kindly things. He ate nothing and he meditated for two days. Nothing happened, and the young man felt despair. On the third day, weak and faint, he wondered whether any spirit would come to him. He lay on his bed, and suddenly saw a bright light at the lodge door. At first, the man was frightened, but then he saw that a beautiful woman had entered his lodge. She was richly and gaily dressed in many flowing garments of green and yellow colors. She had a plume of waving feathers on her head, and she had long, light hair, very different from Indian hair.

She spoke in a soft, musical voice. "I have come in response to your fasting." The man tried to approach her, but she seemed to move away. He told her he was lonely and he wanted her to stay with him. She told him that if he did just exactly as she said, she would be with him always. She would return to him the next day and tell him what to do.

When the woman returned, the man was very faint in body, but strong at heart. He said, "I have continued my fast to show you my good heart. Now you have promised that you will never leave me." "You have won your desire, she said, "and your fast will soon be over. This is what you must do." And she took the man by his hand and led him from the lodge.

Outside, some distance from the lodge, was a meadow of dry grass. The woman told the man to rub two dry sticks together quickly, holding them in the grass. Soon sparks flew, and the grass caught fire. Then the woman said, "When the sun goes down, you must take me by my hair and drag me across the field. After that you may eat." The man did not want to drag her, but she told him he must, and if he did, he would never again be hungry. When evening came, he did as he had been told. The woman disappeared, but wherever he had dragged her, a tall and graceful plant arose. On it were golden clusters of grain, and on each cluster the man could see the light silky hair of the woman. It was corn, the friend of all mankind, and every spring it grows again as the Indians plant the kernels in the ground.

ARTIST FINDS USE FOR ST. HELENS ASH

Greg Haugen, an art teacher at Flandreau Indian School, South Dakota, has recently discovered a new type of glaze for pottery - volcanic ash. Upon obtaining five gallons of the ash from Mt. St. Helens, Washington, Haugen got the idea to use it in pottery-making from his sister in Seattle.

Haugen says, "When I heard about the idea, I thought it would be a novel thing to try." Mixing the ash with gum solution and water, the result is a grey color. (Glass blowers have also used this material, which turns it a beer bottle brown). When fired in a kiln, it turns glossy, reddish-brown.

## DEATH NOTICES

GEORGE WILFORD OJIBWAY, II

GEORGE WILFORD OJIBWAY, II, a Chippewa Indian, died December 20, 1981 at William Beaumont Hospital in Royal Oak of a heart attack. He was 59. Beloved husband of Mary Jane; dear father of Steven, Richard, George III, Mrs. Angela Ashfal, Mrs. Gloria Coon and Mrs. Maria Allen, brother of Georgina and Joan. He was buried December 23, 1981 at the Holy Sepulchre Cemetery in Southfield.

George was born in Sault Ste. Marie on April 5, 1922. He served in the U.S. Marines, and had been employed as a security guard.

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Waunetta Dominic

Indian rights activist Waunetta Dominic, president of the 7,000 member Northern Michigan Ottawa Association (NMOA), died in Little Traverse Hospital, Petoskey.

Mrs. Dominic, an Ottawa Indian, died of respiratory failure. She was 61.

She was born in Bay Shore between Petoskey and Charlevoix. Her father the late Levi McClellan, had been active in Indian affairs, and Mrs. Dominic helped found the NMOA with her husband Robert in 1948.

It was intended to help non-reservation Michigan Indians, both Chippewas and Ottawas, press for settlement of claims for 17 million acres ceded to the federal government in the Treaties of 1821 and 1836. These lands ultimately became the major portion of the state of Michigan.

Using Indian rolls dating from the early 19th century, the Dominics translated original Indian names and traced descendants. In the process, Mrs. Dominic became an expert on Indian treaties and scrolls - as well as the modern American political process. Their work was a success.

From 1968-71, they helped Michigan Indians win a \$12 million settlement for descendants of the 1836 treaty signers and \$900,000 for descendants of the 1821 treaty signers of the Grand River Band.

Mrs. Dominic, who had received her formal education at Haskell Indian College in Lawrence, Kansas, assumed the presidency of the NMOA when her husband died in 1976.

Mrs. Dominic is survived by five sons, a daughter, a brother and 10 grandchildren.

#### IAIA CREATIVE WRITING MAGAZINE WINS IN NATIONAL CONTEST

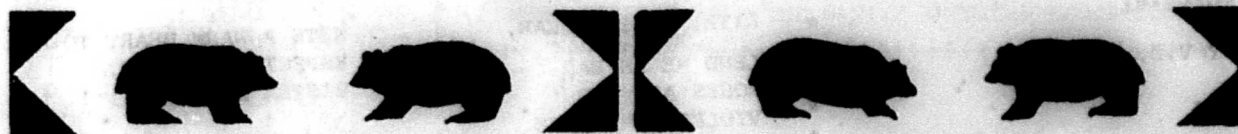
