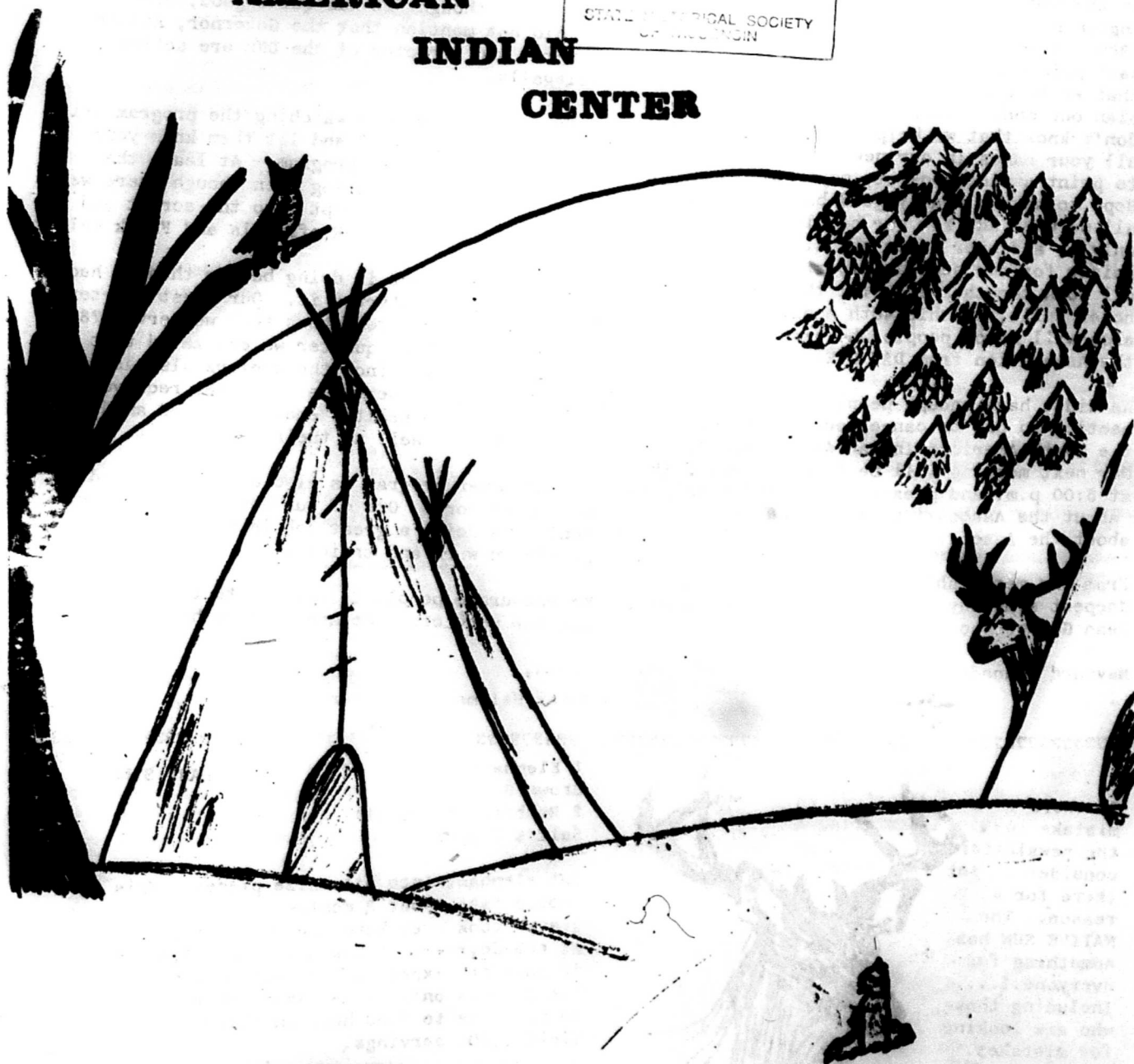

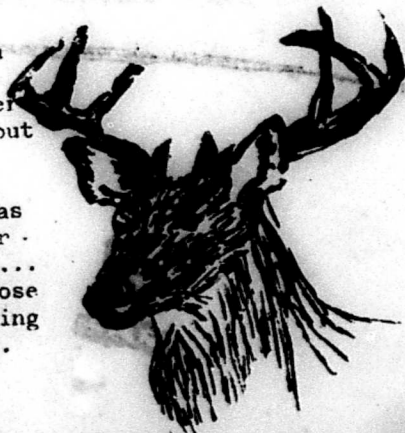

DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Many of you may have seen the Channel 7 special report on Indian fishing in the Great Lakes shown on Friday night January 11th.

Overall I thought it was quite good, even though it did not mention that the Governor, Attorney General and Director of the DNR are acting illegally.

I suggest that anyone watching the program write a letter to Channel 7 and let them know your feelings about their program. At least the Indian side got a hearing even though there were certain slurs which crept into the script and the comments of the DNR officials and Frank Kelley.

Our Senior project is doing better than we had planned when we started it. Our first quarter report just completed shows that we served 78 seniors. For that quarter we estimated that we would reach 30. Since the seniors also are eligible for other services too, they received assistance from Health, emergency food and transportation as well as their own project.

The manpower program is also doing some good placement work. One of our counselors in particular is doing a great job in placing Indian people in work and training.

We encourage people to come in to the center and use our services. We are here to help.

HOW TO RECOGNIZE THE SIGNS

AN ABUSED CHILD...GVIA Jan.1980

- *bears welds, other skin injuries
 - *is often unclean; clothes are dirty or inappropriate for the weather
 - *exhibits extremes of behavior— is unusually aggressive or destructive, or extremely passive and withdrawn; cries excessively or shows no response to pain or pleasure
 - *has severely abnormal eating habits
 - *is either unusually adult in actions or overly immature
 - *seems unduly afraid of parents
 - *is unpleasant, hard to get along with, demanding, a cause of trouble
 - *is wary of physical contact, apprehensive when approached by another child [particularly one who is crying]
 - *is habitually absent from or late to school [maybe kept home until the physical evidence of abuse disappears]
 - *begs or steals food
 - *engages in frequent vandalism, sexual misconduct, or use of alcohol or drugs
 - *needs glasses, medical attention
 - *shows severely retarded physical or mental growth
 - *is often tired without energy

WIC stand for Special Supplemental food program for women, infants and children The program provides nutritious food for

- [1] pregnant and nursing women
- [2] infants up to 1 year
- [3] children up to 5 years

Qualifications:

- must live in defined geographical area.
- be eligible to receive or be receiving low cost health care.
- must show identification of nutritional risk.
- based on annual gross income, before deductions.

INDIAN PUDDING

3 cups milk
1/3 cup cornmeal
1/2 cup honey
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
1 tablespoon molasses
1/2 cup raisins

Scald the milk. Combine cornmeal with honey, salt and cinnamon. Pour hot milk over them and stir well. Mix in molasses and raisins. Pour into buttered baking dish and bake at 350 degrees for 1 1/2 hours. Stir several times during baking. Serve hot or cold, plain or with whipped cream.

Other people from the community brought dishes to pass, and while we don't know all their names or who brought what, we want to take this opportunity to express our appreciation and thanks for their help

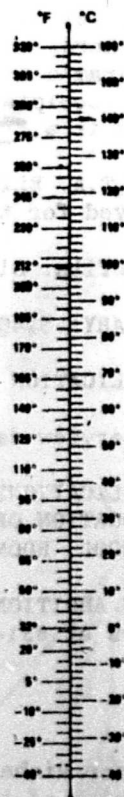

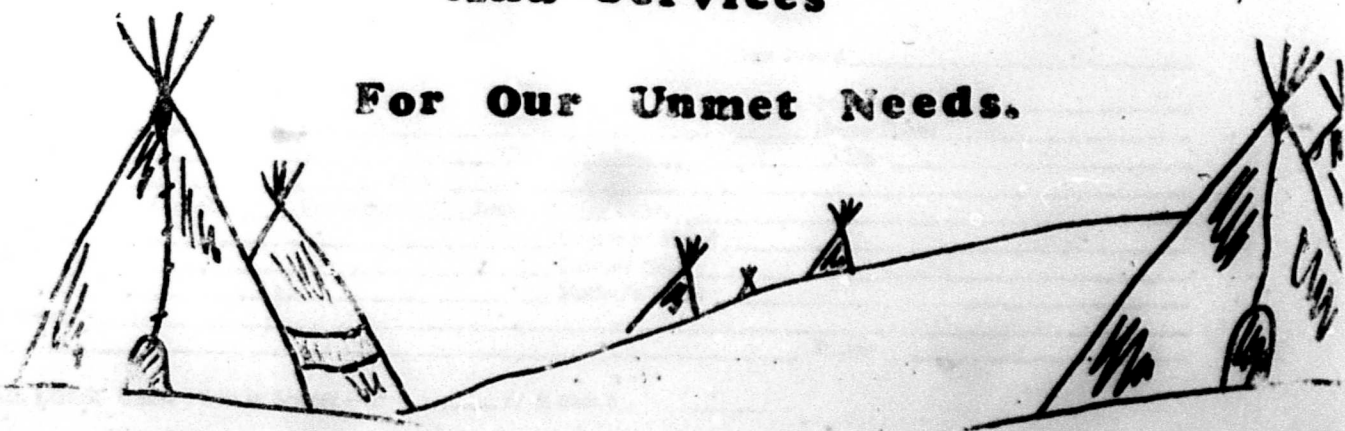
