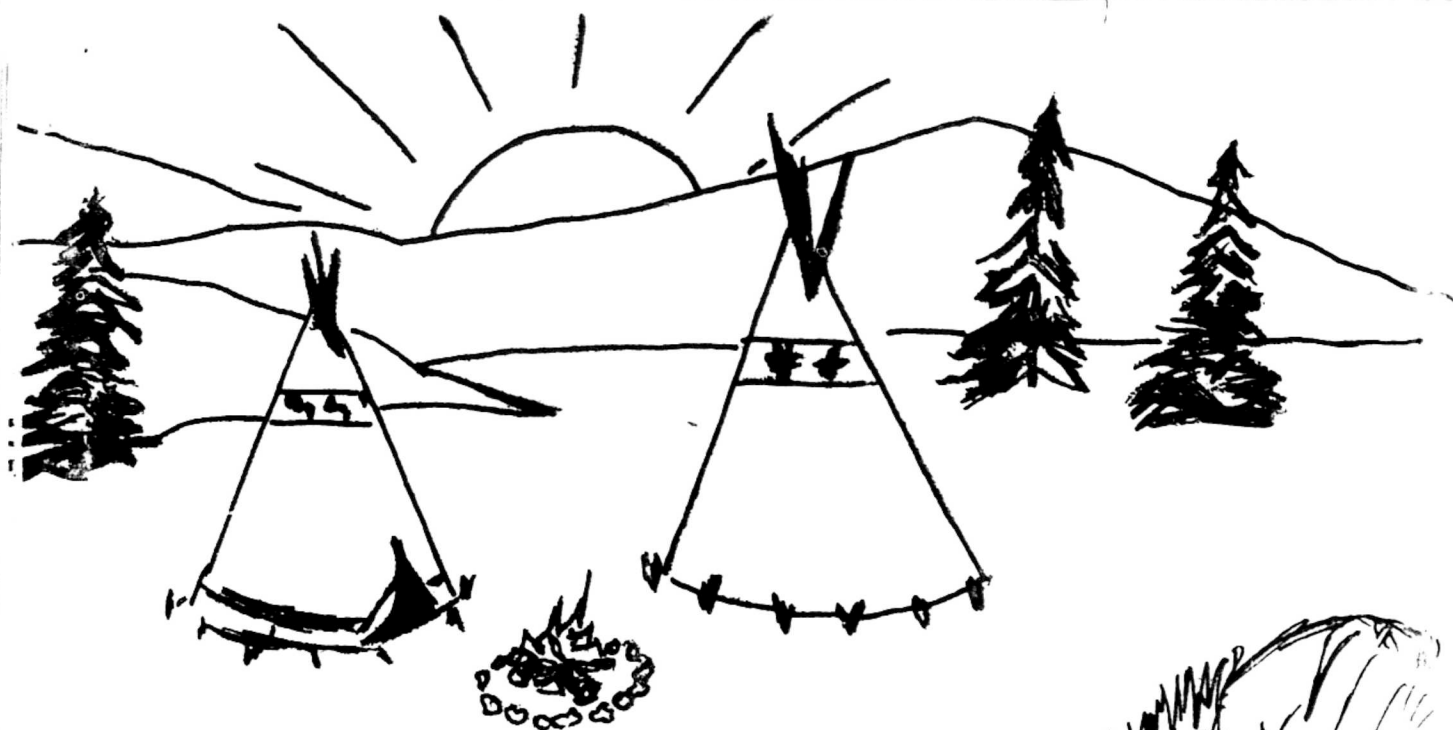

FUNDING CUTS FACE INDIAN CENTER

The Federal Administration threatens to remove CETA funds from urban Indian grantees. For those of you familiar with operations in Detroit, most of the employees at the Indian Center are CETA funded positions. Senior driver, Head Start drivers, Financial and Secretarial staff, not to mention the Manpower training unit are all threatened if this project is eliminated.

To continue, we need letters going to Senators Levin and Riegle, and your local Congressman, telling him that we need this program. Urge him to support the Hawkins or Kennedy bill which keeps urban projects intact. The Administration proposal is not acceptable.

The Hazel Park Pow-wow is on for April 3rd. There were some problems with that date, but they have been cleared up. I will be out-of-state at that time and won't be able to join you there, but I will be with you in spirit as you share hope and support for one another at the pow-wow.

The Indian Center is working hard this year to raise non-federal support financially and through contributions of businessmen's time, to create opportunities for Indians who want to become businessmen. We are looking for Indian people who would like to consider operating their own businesses, or people who would like to become trained in marketing products made within the confines of Indian reservations throughout the United States. While we cannot make any promises, please write us a letter indicating if you are interested in such a possibility. Address it to the Attention: of James R. Hillman, Executive Director.

If you think we should be providing a service like this to help Indians get set up in business, please drop us a letter to that effect, it will help us get funding for the project.

BIA'S INDIAN NEWS NOTES

ALASKA NATIVES RECEIVE 23,000 ACRES ON ADMIRALTY ISLAND

Interior Secretary James Watt awarded December 9, 1981, 23,000 timbered acres on Admiralty Island off southeast Alaska to the Sitka-based Shee-Atika Native Corporation. The land had been selected by the village corporation under the Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act but the selection was frustrated by years of delay, because of opposition by the Sierra Club and other groups. Under the Alaska National Interest Lands Conservation Act of 1980, some 90 percent of the island's one million acres was formally designated a wilderness area. The island is famous for its Sitka Spruce, other old-growth forest resources, bears, eagles and other wildlife.

OGLALA SIOUX LOSE SUPREME COURT APPEAL; WILL TAKE CASE TO UNITED NATIONS

The United States Supreme Court on January 19 refused to hear an appeal from the Oglala Sioux Tribe of South Dakota which was seeking the restoration of Black Hills land taken from the Sioux Indians in 1877. The Supreme Court had ruled in 1980 that the seizure of some 7 million acres of land from the Sioux was unconstitutional. As a result of this decision the Sioux were to receive more than \$100 million in compensation -- but no land. The Oglala, one of eight Sioux tribes involved in the 58-year-old suit, had split off from the other seven before the 1980 decision and had refused to renew its contract with the lawyer who had handled the case for 24 years. They said they would not be bound by any monetary settlement without restoration of the land. A tribal lawyer said that efforts would now shift to the United Nations where, since 1980, the Human Rights Commission has been investigating a charge by the Sioux that the Federal government's handling of the Indians claim violates international law.

ARRESTS MADE IN CALIFORNIA AND OREGON FOR ILLEGAL SALMON SALES

State and federal wildlife agents arrested 19 persons in California and 3 in Oregon January 22 for the illegal sale of salmon caught in the Klamath-Trinity Rivers. The 19 persons arrested in California -- 16 Indians and three non-Indians -- were booked under a recent state law forbidding the sale of fish caught with gill nets. According to a report in the LOS ANGELES TIMES, they could be charged with a misdemeanor or a felony depending on the circumstances, and could be fined up to \$5,000 and sentenced to state prison for up to three years. Those arrested in Oregon were involved in the purchase of the fish. The Klamath and Trinity Rivers flow through the Hoopa Valley Indian Reservation in northern California. Most of the Indians involved in the arrests were reported to be members of the Hoopa, Yurok and Karok tribes of that area. Wildlife officials told the TIMES they hoped prosecution would be under the California law because of the relatively heavy penalties. They said that Indians arrested for illegally selling salmon have generally been tried in a special court of Indian offenses set up under the Bureau of Indian Affairs and have been given light penalties or let off altogether. An attorney for the California Indian Legal Services said the state law discriminates against Indians because it refers specifically to gill nets and only Indians are allowed to use those nets.

NATIVE AMERICAN INSTITUTE

A new institute charged with providing expertise and educational opportunities to Michigan's 40,000 Native Americans has been established at Michigan State University. The Native American Institute, which includes staff from each of the three major tribal groups of Michigan -- Chippewa, Ottawa and Potawatami -- has been housed in Michigan State University's Urban Affairs Programs unit.

Groundwork for the Institute's program was initiated early this year with funds provided to MSU from the State of Michigan. Institute coordinator for training and service, Jack M. Bain, said that most initial projects will be aimed at improving the climate for developing successful Native American businesses in Michigan through training and public policy research.

This winter the Institute plans to release a report on public policy alternatives for the encouragement of Native American economic development, according to the Institute's coordinator for research and development, Bill Cross.

One project underway is the planning for a Native American Trade Fair which will make important sources of contracts aware of Indian businesses and identification of Indian businesses in Michigan, both of which may lay the foundation for an Indian business association.

The Native American Institute is also targeting technical assistance on a limited basis.

"We don't have the resources to respond to requests from all Native businesses, right now," says Institute Associate George Cornell, who is coordinating economic development projects, "We hope to increase that capability soon, though."

Cornell has already assisted the Burt Lake Band of Ottawa and Chippewa in the securing of a \$6,700.00 grant from the Michigan Council of the Arts which will fund the planning and market analysis for cottage industries to be operated by the Band. Cornell will continue to work with the project leaders Margaret Martell, Rosanna Dashner, and Louise Reznik, to complete the planning of the industries the next year.

Institute staff are also attempting to help some of the state's Indian centers which are faced with severe government funding curtailments. The Lansing and Flint centers are eyeing the establishment of their own business enterprises as alternative sources of funding to support the centers. The Institute is assisting with the development of business plans.

Institute labor specialist, Ed Whitepigeon, points to the worsening economic situation as reason for coming up with strategies which will increase income and jobs for Michigan Natives.

"Natives in our urban areas will be hit disproportionately by job losses," Whitepigeon says.

The Michigan Department of Labor has contracted the Institute to complete a number of employment projects including the development of a job bank for Indians which will be co-sponsored by the Institute and the Commission on Indian Affairs.

The Institute has been authorized to continue until September 30, 1983, under an executive action by MSU Provost C.L. Winder on behalf of President M. Cecil Mackey. The action was made possible by a new policy adopted which allows temporary institutes to be established by the President. Similar Institutes have been established in four other states.

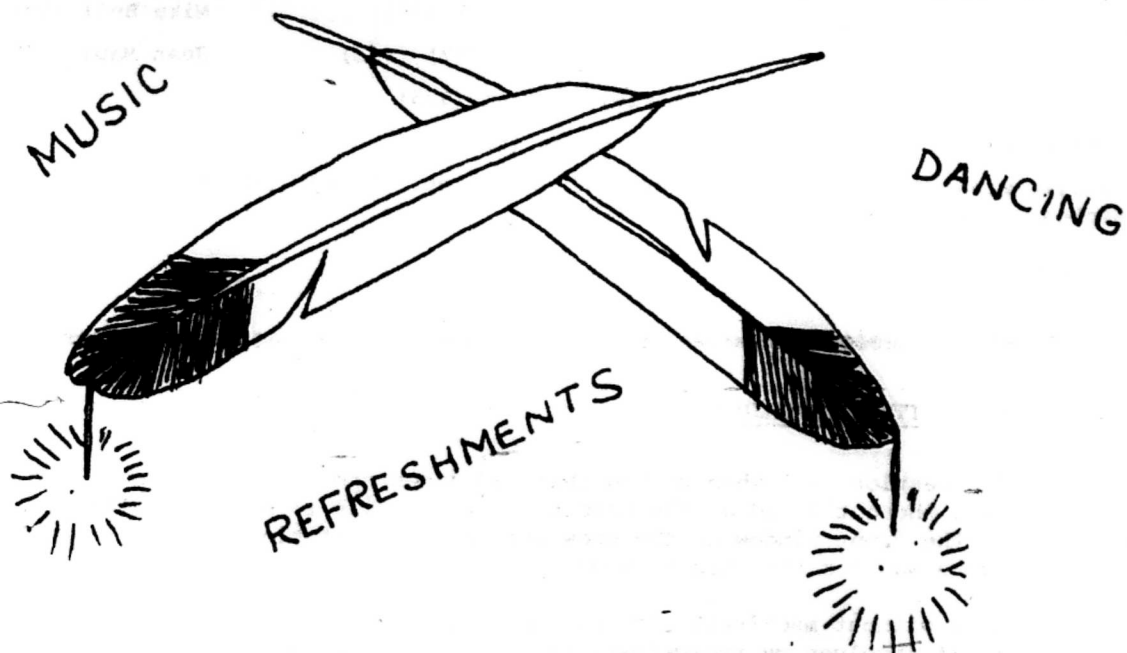

WHERE WOULD WE BE WITHOUT MACHINES?

I pondered this question back when we had that bad snowstorm. This may sound far-fetched, but it was just a thought I had at the moment and would like to share it with you. I was looking out the front window as the snow was falling, watching the tractors plow through it to make way for the cars to move.

Where would we be without machines? At this moment, I am typing with one. When I print the newsletter, it involves my typewriter, an electrical scanner, and a printing machine. They help to relay information to you from the newsletter department. All machines do benefit us in their own way and each is made for a certain purpose. Just as we have hands to handle things and feet to walk and run with.

Look around, they are all around you, the cars, tractors, fans, and all the technical and mechanical devices that make life a little more comfortable and easier - at home or in the work place. This list goes on and on. "Civilization" has come to depend on machines so much in modern society. Did you ever think that if all these items were taken from you, would you be able to adapt to the changes of this fast paced society? To be in harmony with the natural world.

This is also an environmental question. It is not just our dependability on machines that made me think of this question, but the harm in the manufacturing of products by machines that have effect on our natural environment. Gases and chemicals emitted into our air, water, land, poisoning the earth. Caused by the industrialization of our "society".

In some parts of the world, in places still untouched by "civilization, people still live in their own natural world, without the conveniences of industrialized countries. They do not depend on materialistic things, but thrive and still live off of the land for their clothing, shelter and food, adapted to a natural environment. Slowly, "civilization" is closing in on these people and the animals of these isolated grounds.

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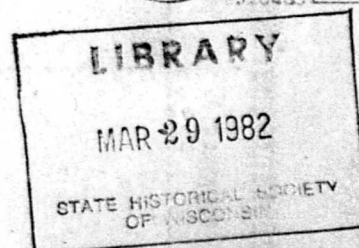

FROM OUT OF THE CAVE IN THE NORTH CAME THE FIRST BUFFALO. PURE WHITE WAS HIS THICK ROBE AND HIS HORNS AND HOOVES WERE BLACK.
