AMERICAN INDIAN MAKES BID FOR RACE

Don Spence, a Oneida Indian from Colorado and relative of Ralph Antone of Detroit, Michigan is an amateur cyclist. He is also a grandson of Mrs. Sadie Richard (Schuyler), who is from the Oneida of the Thames.

Don and three teammates from Colorado entered the Hong Kong International Bicycle Race held last August. The four racers combined their skills to capture second place. The competition they entered in Hong Kong consisted of 3 stages, a one-mile climb time trial, a 124-kilometer (76 miles) road race, through steep, mountainous Asian terrain and a 45-kilometer "criterium" around a closed course. The road race was the most difficult.

Although an amateur, he takes his riding seriously, works 3 months out of the year and spends the other 9 riding. Upcoming cycling competitions will be held in New Mexico and Venezuela - which he plans to attend, but the ultimate goal is to be in the 1984 Olympics. He is now in Venezuela and then he will be on his way to New Mexico, from there he will be traveling to Italy.

LEGEND OF BLACKBIRD HILL

On the Omaha Indian Reservation in northeastern Nebraska high above the great smokey waters, (Missouri River) stands Blackbird Hill, a memorial to the famous Omaha Chief.

Blackbird Hill has stood as a sentinel for countless generations. Lewis and Clark, early European explorers, visited this site in 1804 and mentioned the burial mound of the famous chieftain, ruler of the Omaha Nation for more than forty years.

Among the Omahas the legend still lives of a woman ghost whose shrill cry echoes throughout the valley below Blackbird Hill on the night of October 17. Many Omahas of all ages gather on the lonely windswept hill at midnight to hear the cry in the wind of a lost soul. "Must she forever cry?" they ponder.

The legend says that a beautiful fair young maiden was given in marriage by her father as a status symbol to the old Chief Blackbird following age-old tribal custom; however, the maiden's heart belonged to a handsome young brave. In her dilemma, she jumped from a high cliff to the angry waters below, and a piercing cry marked her untimely death. It was believed by the old Omahas that not only did her soul traverse the Milky Way to the spirit world beyond, but also that her spirit would return to earth annually to re-enact her death since she had left so unwillingly.

The legend continues, that upon hearing the death cry of the young maiden, the old Chief became remorseful over the tragedy. Feeling ashamed and guilty, he would not eat for many days at a time, although his other wives were there to console him. Finally, a little child carrying a cup of spring water was sent to him. The old Chief, upon seeing the child, drank from the cup, once again began to face reality, and continued his life anew.

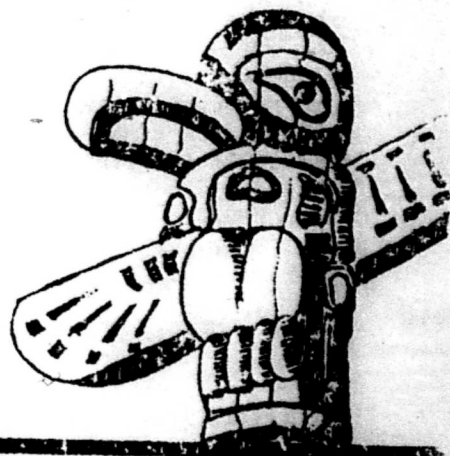

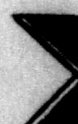
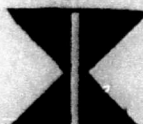

CENTER CLOSING POLICY
SNOW AND INCLEMENT WEATHER

When the Center might be closed due to inclement weather or because of emergency of disaster conditions the following policy shall be effect.

When the Detroit Public Schools are closed, the Center will provide no transportation. The Head Start Program will be closed.

Staff is given the option of reporting to work or not reporting to work. However, those not reporting will not be paid if the administrative staff have the building available for work. All staff will be paid when the Center cannot open.

The public and staff, on days when the Detroit Public Schools are closed, should call before coming to the Center. All services which do not require transportation will be available if the staff can be in to take care of it. However, public should call before coming down to insure that the service they want has a staff person to handle it before they venture out.

No disciplinary action will accrue when the Detroit Public Schools are closed and a staff person opts to stay home due to inclement or dangerous conditions. However, no person will be paid if they do not report to work when the building is opened. Persons arriving late will be paid starting the time they report to the Center. They will not be considered a disciplinary late ring.

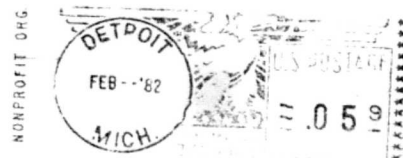
ONE NIGHT I HAD A DREAM
